Aggression on inpatient units: Clinical characteristics ...

Staff members often attributed aggression and violence to internal patient factors rather than situational/relational or organisational factors. The descriptions of violent acts included verbal threats, serious assault and death threats.

Violence and Aggression - NICE

Aggression and violence are common in psychiatric wards especially in psychiatric intensive care units and amongst detained patients with psychotic symptoms and personality issues. This does not mean that they are dangerous, instead adequate management may actually

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help them recover and reduce the need for restrictions whilst caring for them.

How can we reduce violence and aggression in psychiatric ...

Violence and aggression obviously has a profound effect on inpatient settings, compromising our service users ' care and staff experience at work. The hard work and courage of staff in City and Hackney and Newham to share and learn together in their local violence reduction collaboratives, is now changing the systems people are working in and transforming experience.

Violence and aggression - NICE Pathways

1.2.11 Consider using an actuarial prediction instrument such as the BVC (Brøset Violence Checklist) or the DASA IV (Dynamic Appraisal of Situational Aggression – Inpatient Version), rather than unstructured clinical judgement alone, to monitor and reduce incidents of violence and aggression and to help develop a risk management plan in inpatient psychiatric settings.

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1 Recommendations | Violence and aggression: short-term ...

This guideline covers the short-term management of violence and aggression in adults (aged 18 and over), young people (aged 13 to 17) and children (aged 12 and under). It is relevant for mental health, health and community settings.

Violence and aggression: short-term management in mental ...

Inpatient psychiatric violence poses a significant risk to patient and staff health. Risk factors offer staff an opportunity to predict and prevent aggression through thorough violence assessments. Pharmacotherapy, isolation, and restraints provide a valuable core of intervention options that will likely never be replaced, but it could be beneficial to begin to view these as more of a last line of defense.

Incidence of violence and aggression Violence by patients is a common problem on acute inpatient community psychiatric units worldwide.^{1,2}

However, available data are unreliable as to the incidence of violence and aggression in psychiatric settings, especially in community hospitals.

Violence and aggression are a substantial occupational health issue. In this study, nursing staff were the most common target of assaults. Nursing staff members almost always responded to an incident of aggression or violence, which may be due to their expertise, greater proportion on the staff, and availability.

Inpatient aggression in community hospitals | CNS ...

Patient/staff work-groups were asked to replace ad hoc unit rules with expectations for civil behavior that apply to patients and staff. Patients were trained to co-lead groups dealing with accepting responsibility for their own recovery. Debriefing techniques. The patient and staff are debriefed after every restraint and seclusion episode.
